

Healthy Kids are School Ready


*327 Head Start & Early Head Start children completed physicals.

*325 children received vision screenings, with 11 children (3.38%) receiving treatment such as glasses, etc.





AGENCY SUMMARY

Executive Director Note

On behalf of the NEK-CAP, Inc., Multi-County Board of Directors and staff we thank community members, volunteers and partners for your support of both low-income individuals and families and the NEK-CAP, Inc., commitments to address the causes and conditions of poverty, and to improve the economic mobility of those served through agency programs and services across Northeast and North Central Kansas.

In November 2021 the agency celebrated 56 years of serving low-income individuals, families and communities. Through continuous assessment, planning, and evaluation of agency systems and programs, we maximize the resources entrusted to us to accomplish our mission. Our work is done primarily by administering federal resources from the Department of Health and Human Services and Department of Housing and Urban Development; state resources from Kansas Housing Resources Corporation and Kansas Department of Education; and local resources from the United Way of Greater Topeka, Atchison United Way and Konza United Way; Hiawatha Community Fund and the Doniphan County Community Fund; and from other private donors. In addition during 2021-2022 through partnerships with Thrive Allen County Navigator Program funded by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid and the KU Medical Center Department of Family Medicine Communities Organizing to Promote Equity (COPE) Project funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention/Kansas Department of Health and Environment, the agency focused on the uninsured, the role of poverty on the social determinants of health outcomes, and the issue of health inequities experienced by vulnerable populations.


Although pandemic-related funding had been exhausted, through the resources described above, collaborative partnerships, and tireless, dedicated staff who worked through stressful conditions associated with COVID-19 then followed by the tri-demic 3,189 individuals from prenatal moms to adults 65 and older were served. We care about the entire community, and we are dedicated to helping people help themselves and each other."


